



## **HISTORICAL BACKGROUND**

The building on Governor Nicholls St. was erected in 1822 for a plantation owner for use as his townhouse on visits to the port city of New Orleans to sell his cotton. During the Civil War, this building served as one of three hospitals in the Quarter. The street name at that time was Rue de l'Hospital. The street name was later changed to honor Governor Francis T. Nicholls who was a war general before being elected as governor of Louisiana.

The larger house is located on world famous Bourbon Street which was named after the French House of Bourbon. Who could have known then that it would become the street of cabarets and restaurants where the drink of the same name became popular. How aptly named. This house served as a town home also for wealthy plantation owners who traveled to the thriving port to ship their products on merchant vessels bound for Europe.
